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

#### MESSAGE FROM THE MEC

#### We diligently continue our work to fulfill the aspirations of our people.

In terms of the provision of infrastructure. we have made significant progress in the past 12 months to ensure that sufficient education facilities are available. Furthermore, we have a number of ongoing programmes such as relocation of prefabricated buildings; provision of additional classrooms: furniture: water and sanitation; school maintenance; and building of new schools and hostels which are under way.

Normally at the start of the year, there are also several unplanned issues which demand our immediate attention such as schools that were vandalised by criminal elements in our communities. As an example, the start of the school year is not one that the learners and staff of Alphendale High School in East London looked forward to. The school was ransacked in the December holidays and stripped of electrical infrastructure and equipment. The school buildings were also vandalised, and damages are estimated to run in the millions. Vandalism of schools and theft of resources are cowardly acts which causes untold disruption and is a huge setback to learners and teachers.

Despite curved balls such as these, we start our year off with renewed vigor as we diligently continue our work to fulfil the aspirations of our people.

Our infrastructure planning is biased towards 'no-fee' schools and this is a deliberate attempt to close the resource In this edition of Sakh'isidima News we share information on several initiatives currently under way to ensure that we provide infrastructure to support teaching and learning to schools in the Eastern

We can be proud of the work we have done, and progress made but we should never be complacent. Drawing inspiration from the milestones of 2022, we look forward to the 2023 academic year with renewed energy, enthusiasm, and bold determination.


















# Its all systems GO for the 2023 academic year

The 2023 academic year commenced on 18 January 2023 for learners at public schools in the Eastern Cape. To ensure a smooth start to the year the Department embarked on several initiatives to share information on our readiness to tackle the year. Some of these initiatives include media briefings by the MEC for Education and HoD; and stakeholder meetings and visits to schools by the leadership and top management team in support of the programme led by the Eastern Cape Provincial Legislature.

As a department, school readiness covers the following priority areas:


- a) Admission of learners.
- b) Infrastructure and provision of school furniture.
- c) Availability of Learner and Teacher Support Materials (LTSM).
- d) Availability of teachers as per Post Provisioning Norms (PPN).
- e) Preparedness to start the National School Nutrition Programme (NSNP).
- f) Provision of Scholar Transport.


Next to enrolments and scholar transport, availability of quality infrastructure to meet the demands of schools across the province, is a critical focus area.

The Physical Resources Management Team was deployed to accompany the Members of the Provincial Legislature on their school readiness visits to provide information on school infrastructure, visiting several schools that were included in the previous 2022 school readiness programme.

To ensure that school infrastructure is available to support teaching and learning, several programmes are under way. Let's look at some of these initiatives:






















Projects to rehabilitate facilities damaged by storms were completed at several schools across the province in the third quarter of the 2022-23 financial year. These are feature here.



# Promoting social welfare through sanitation infrastructure



The Tirisano Construction Fund aims to "improve the quality of life of communities through promoting social and economic welfare". They do this by "funding social infrastructure build programmes aimed at addressing strategic backlogs".

Tirisano have come on board to support the Sanitation Appropriate for Education (SAFE) initiative (launched by President Cyril Ramaphosa in 2018) as part of their Social Infrastructure Programme (SIP). Scores of public and private sector partners have supported the SAFE initiative in the Eastern Cape to date, providing thousands of decent sanitation facilities to schools in a province fraught by historic inequality.

The Tirisano Schools Sanitation Programme will ensure that learners from 15 schools have access to decent, quality, clean toilets.

A Memorandum of Agreement entered between the Department of Basic Education and the Tirisano Construction Fund confirms that the Eastern Cape Department of Education "will continue the ongoing maintenance of the facilities as part of its normal operations and that the ECDoE accepts transfer of the facilities into its asset portfolio.

The project funding to a maximum of R60 million will be applied to the following 15 projects in five education districts:

#### **About.... Tirisano Construction Fund (TCF)**

- Seven programmes form the focus of TCF's efforts toward socio-economic development of communities across South Africa. They are: Enterprise Development Programme; Social Infrastructure Programme (SIP); Engineering Bursaries Programme (EBP); Construction Occupations Development Programme (CODP); Basic Education Programme (BEP); Technical Capacity Programme (TCP); and Professionalising Engineering Practitioners Programme (PEPP).
- TCF is almost 6 years old and received funding of R474,4million in the 2021/22 financial year from seven JSE-listed construction companies to implement their programmes.

# DON'T CLOSE YOUR EYES TO VANDALISM 5



VANDALISM OF GOVERNMENT PROPERTY IS A CRIMINAL OFFENCE.

Scores of schools are broken into by criminal elements who destroy infrastructure and steal equipment. THIS HAS A NEGATIVE IMPACT ON TEACHING AND LEARNING. It costs millions of rands and takes substantial effort to repair vandalised infrastructure.

Situated in Buffalo Flats Ext. 2, Alphendale High School has been plagued by break-ins and vandalism over the past few months.

In December, during the school holidays the school suffered huge damage and losses when vandals once again pounced on the premises causing millions of rands in damage to critical electrical and water infrastructure and making off with equipment.

The infrastructure team visited the school on 10 January 2023 to conduct a condition-based assessment to establish the urgent needs to be addressed in order to get teaching and learning back on track.

The school has an enrolment of over 1 200 learners in this academic year and facilities include four double story classroom blocks, four single story workshops, a hall, two ablution blocks, admin block, two prefab structures, a nutrition hall and covered walkways linking the buildings.

This incident is indeed a sad state of affairs for the learners, educators/staff and the broader community of Buffalo Flats given the socioeconomic challenges in this area. The school has several workshops i.e. automotive; electrical; civil; welding & metal and the delivery of the curriculum will be severely hampered by this calamity.

#### **Damage to plumbing**

The school is connected to the municipal sewer and water reticulation network and the municipal water supply had been shut off by the municipality due to the reported water leaks which were caused by the damaged plumbing the extent of which is visible in most of the areas that had copper pipes.

Water pipes supplying the geysers were stripped and some geysers were removed. There is visible damage to the surface mounted water pipes and most of the taps, and all the fire hose reels nozzles have been stolen.

#### **Electrical infrastructure**

The assessment of the electrical infrastructure (based on SANS 10142 and the OHS Act) found that the four workshops suffered extensive damage to the electrical supply where all distribution boards were stripped of all wiring material including switchgears. The distribution board feeding the workshops was also stripped. A total of ten distribution boards needs to be replaced. In addition, light fittings were stolen, with bare wires exposed. Gas tanks servicing the nutrition hall would also need to be replaced.

#### **Security Fencing**

Although the school is fully fenced with high security fencing a gate had been damaged and a panel had been cut out to gain access to the premises.

#### Doors, windows, and ceilings

These were damaged by the burglars to gain access into the workshops and classrooms. The entrance doors are generally secured with steel gates and a few of the locks were broken to gain access.

The assessment confirmed that immediate work to bring the facilities into an operational state would cost in the region of R6m and would include the following:

- Restoration of electrical infrastructure in the classroom blocks and workshops.
- Restoration of water supply to the ablutions, classrooms, and workshops including replacement of all geysers, taps and associated plumbing in the workshops, classrooms, hall, and nutrition hall. Fixing all water leaks, replacement of damaged waste pipes and fixing and / or replacement of fire hoses.
- Replacement of window and ceiling boards broken during the beak-ins.
- Repairs to workshops roof.
- Replacement of damaged fence panels and gate.

#### What can R6m get you?

These senseless acts of vandalism, destruction and theft sets us back and delays the provision of much-needed infrastructure where required as we need to allocate funds to prepare damaged infrastructure. Let's see what type o infrastructure we could have provided for R6 million\* (the estimated cost of repairs at Alphendale…)
